Why do you think that God put the story of Zacchaeus in the Bible—as opposed to the story of a morally upright citizen?

How should we be addressing this reality in our faith communities and in our own lives? In what ways are we most susceptible to conflating politics with faith? Why is doing so unwise?
- 4. Based on this chapter, identify one way that the Lord might be nudging you toward growth or change. What steps should you take to pursue the change?

Which of the three tempts you the most to keep your own distance, and why?
- 3. Do you believe that Jesus Christ "sees" you in the same way that he saw Nathanael under the tree? If so, how does this awareness impact your affections and receptivity toward him? How does it impact your response to those who seem to want to distance themselves from you?
- 4. Based on this chapter, identify one way that the Lord might be nudging you toward growth or change. What steps should you take to pursue the change?

- 1. Name one thing from this chapter that troubled you, inspired you, or both. Why were you impacted in this way?
- 2. Have you ever experienced persecution? If so, describe the experience. How did it impact your relationship with Christ? With other people?
