




FIGURE 1.3. The nations mentioned at Pentecost




FIGURE 2.1. Early expansion of the church from Jerusalem to Samaria to Syria




FIGURE 2.4. Paul's second missionary journey




FIGURE 2.5. Timeline of Paul's life and ministry




FIGURE 3.2. Parthian Persia




FIGURE 4.4. Archeological remains of a baptistery in a house church at Dura Europos, Syria, dated to the third century




FIGURE 9.5. India




FIGURE 10.1. An artist's reconstruction of the acropolis at Carthage during the Roman period




FIGURE 12.2. Icon of Athanasius dated to the end of the seventeenth century, Sozopol, Bulgaria




FIGURE 13.1. Early Byzantine mosaic of John Chrysostom from the Cathedral of Hagia Sophia, Istanbul, Turkey




FIGURE 15.1. A detailed relief from the Sarcophagus of Junius Bassus (359) portraying the original sin of Adam and Eve with symbols of work in the background




FIGURE 15.3. Hagia Sophia was truly innovative. This new style was more square than rectangular, consisting of a dramatic central dome, resting on piers that were supported by half domes.




FIGURE 16.2. Christianity in the sixth century




FIGURE 16.4. The pagoda from the Ta Qin monastery, founded in the seventh century.




FIGURE 17.1. The Ka'bah, a cubical structure made of granite, surrounded by pilgrims in present-day Mecca




FIGURE 18.1. The spread of Islam




FIGURE 18.2. One of the oldest mosques in the world, the Al-Omari Mosque in Bosra, Syria, was founded by Caliph Umar and completed by Caliph Yazid II (eighth century). Renovations to the mosque were made between the twelfth and thirteenth centuries. Al-Omari Mosque has suffered significant damage from the conflicts in Syria.




FIGURE 19.3. Known in Spain as Mezquita-Catedral, the Great Mosque of Cordoba is an architectural treasure from the eighth century. The highly-detailed wall with the horseshoe arch indicates the location of the mihrab or prayer niche, the place in a mosque that faces Mecca. And high above is a gold dome, constructed with crossing arches.
