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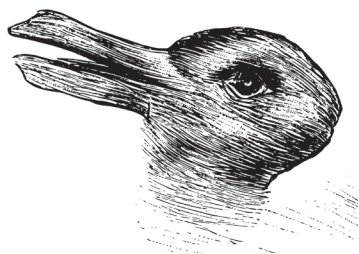
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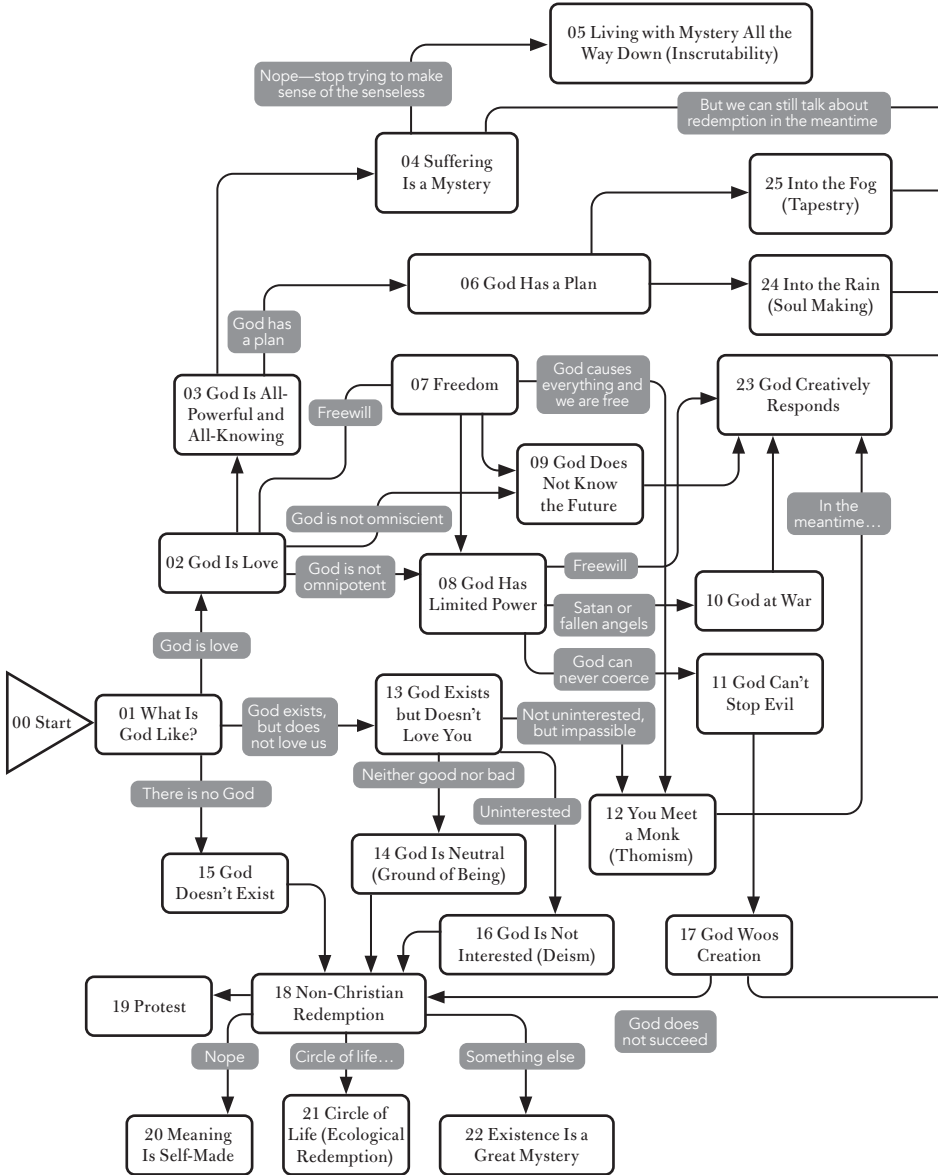
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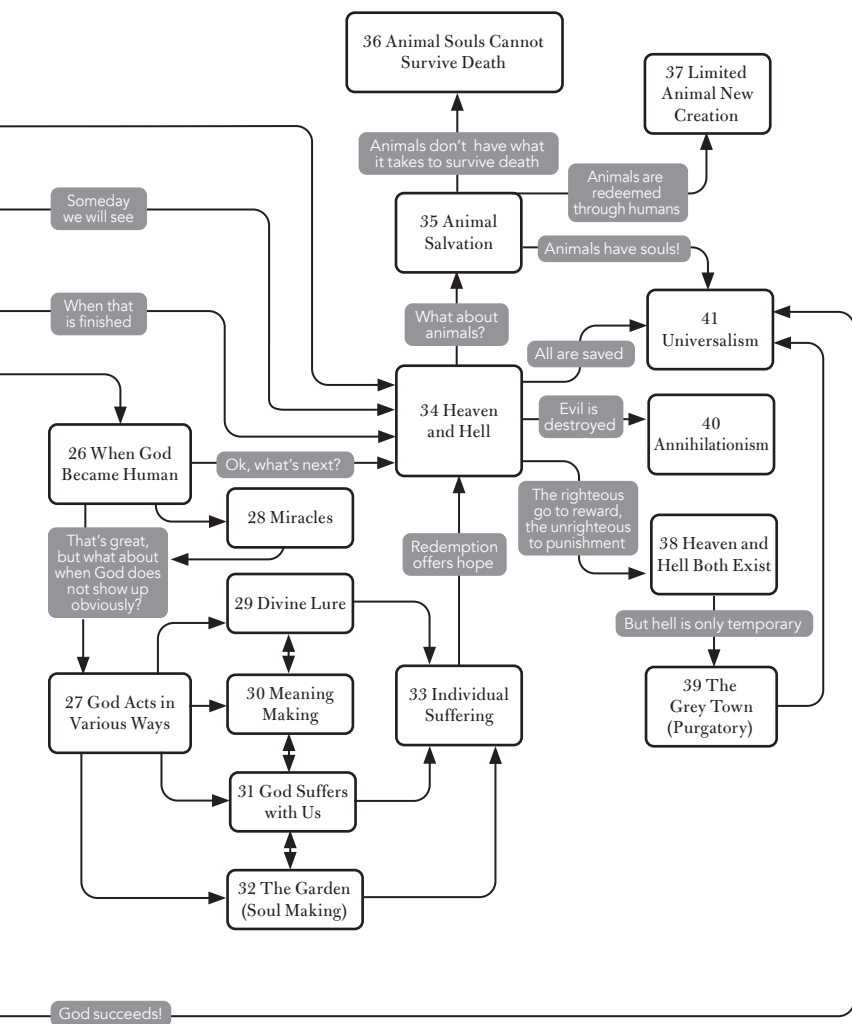
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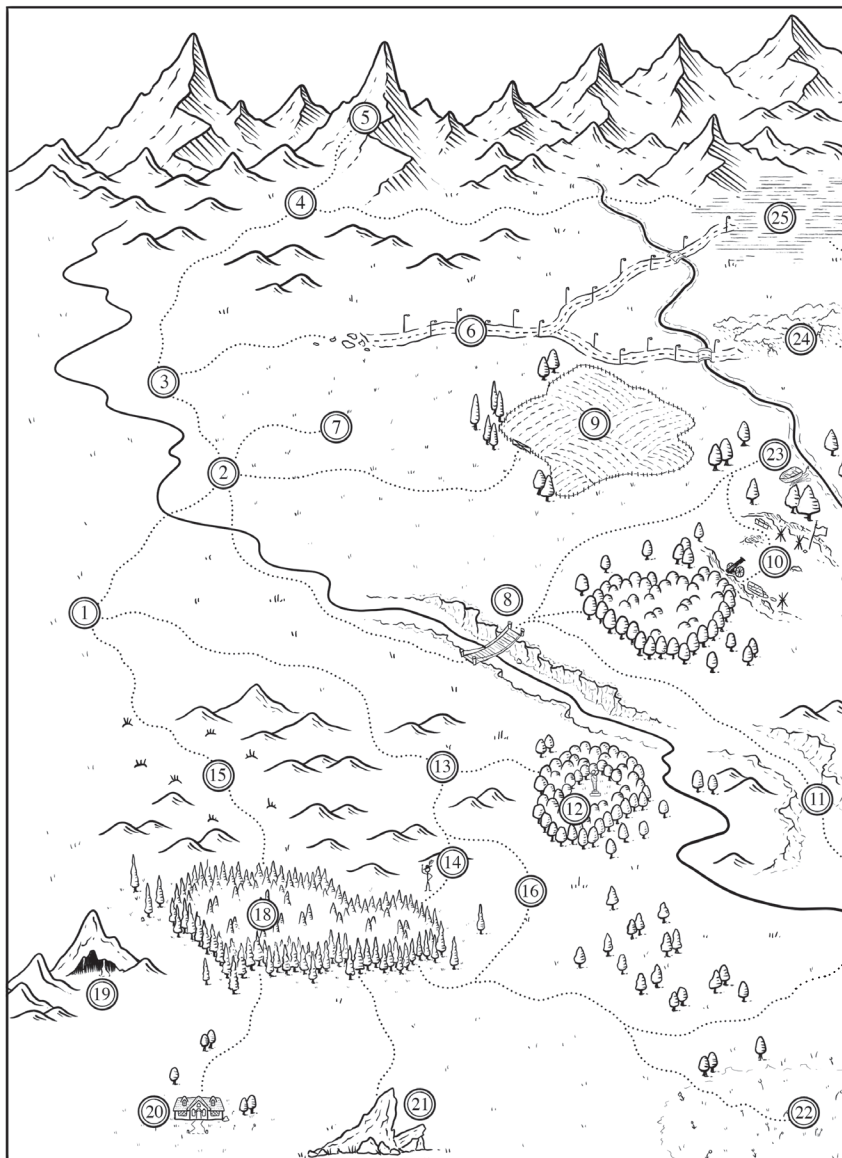


The Flowchart

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As opposed to most bibliographies, which are listed alphabetically by author's name, I have arranged these roughly in terms of accessibility. That is, the ones nearer the top of each section are easier to read, with the heavyweight academic texts nearer the bottom of each list. If you want to know more about a topic, try the top one. If you want to jump into a dissertation on the topic, try the bottom one. A few books show up a couple of times under different headings. Please take this as my glowing recommendation of that book. The more times it shows up, the more I think you should read it.
