THE AMERICAN STATE OF MIND

Abbreviation: BWV stands for Biblical Worldview

Key: "Born-again Christian, with BWV" includes people who believe in absolute moral truth; make their moral choices by following a set of specific principles or standards based on the Bible; trust Christ for their salvation; and reflect a biblical perspective on six key faith issues (salvation, trust in the Bible, personal responsibility to evangelize, Satan's existence, Jesus' sinless life, and the nature of God).

"Born-again Christian, without BWV" includes people who have made a personal commitment to Jesus Christ that is important in their life and believe they will go to Heaven because they have confessed their sins and accepted Jesus Christ as their Savior, but they do not believe in absolute moral truth, or make their moral choices by following a set of specific principles or standards based on the Bible, or do not possess a biblical stand on the six belief statements regarding salvation, trust in the Bible, personal responsibility to evangelize, Satan's existence, Jesus' sinless life, and the nature of God.

"Not a born-again Christian" includes all adults who have not made a personal commitment to Jesus Christ that is important in their life and or who do not believe they will go to Heaven solely because they have confessed their sins and accepted Jesus Christ as their Savior.
