Bucknell students went on strike in May 1970 to protest the National Guard killing of four Kent State students after President Nixon expanded the Vietnam War. Tim and other InterVarsity members engaged the striking students in evangelistic conversations.

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

The first issue of *Table Talk*, edited by Tim and several other Gordon-Conwell students, featured his article "Hermeneutical Nestorianism," which sharply criticized two professors of New Testament.

Tim returned to his alma mater of Gordon-Conwell to deliver the 2016 spring convocation address. By this time, he had become a world-renowned church leader, in contrast to his days as an intelligent but overlooked student.

Tim and Kathy joined more than seventeen thousand young Christians at Urbana '76, which featured speakers Billy Graham, John Perkins, Edmund Clowney, Elisabeth Elliot, and Helen Roseveare. John Stott delivered four expositions on the biblical basis for missions.

Hopewell, Virginia, became the focus of an environmental scandal just before the Kellers arrived in this former home of a DuPont dynamite factory. All three Keller sons were born in Hopewell.


Tim's meager salary in Hopewell didn't include a book budget. But friends and family gave him Banner of Truth titles for Christmas, and he read them throughout the following year. His favorite authors included Thomas Brooks, John Owen, and Charles Spurgeon.

Tim (back row, third from left) joined the faculty of Westminster Theological Seminary in 1984 and took over his mentor Edmund Clowney's courses on preaching and pastoral leadership.



Harvie Conn served as Tim's department chair in practical theology at Westminster Theological Seminary. Conn's emphasis on contextualization paved the way for his colleague Keller to plant a city center church in New York.

Jack Miller was Tim and Kathy's pastor for five years, from 1984 to 1989, at New Life Presbyterian Church in Glenside, Pennsylvania. Before the Kellers planted Redeemer in New York, New Life showed them how a culture of gospel renewal applied to social justice, worship, evangelism, and missions.

New York in the 1970s and 1980s earned a reputation for high crime levels, which discouraged many Christians from moving there to evangelize and start churches. Early Redeemer members prayed for the renewal of the city and believed those prayers were answered as the city prospered in the 1990s.



In June 1989, the Kellers moved to Roosevelt Island in the East River and have never changed apartments. They found on the island a relatively quiet place in the city to raise their family.

Silence descended over New York after the initial cacophony of planes crashing, towers collapsing, and ambulances racing. Not long after the Tuesday attacks, Tim's mind turned to his Sunday message, which was heard by nearly double Redeemer's normal attendance.

Dr. Keller's latest book, The Ministries of Morey, calls churches to obey Jesus' command to minister to the needy in their communities. Tim, his write Kathy, and their three sons will live in Manhattan.





Tim's diagnosis of pancreatic cancer in 2020, along with the COVID-19 pandemic, kept him largely confined to his Roosevelt Island home with Kathy. Not since seminary had the Kellers spent so much time together, and Tim continued to recommend his favorite books, new and old.
