

CHAPTER 1: RUTH Ruth 1:16–22

But Ruth said:

"Entreat me not to leave you,
Or to turn back from following after you;
For wherever you go, I will go;
And wherever you lodge, I will lodge;
Your people shall be my people,
And your God, my God.
Where you die, I will die,
And there will I be buried.
The LORD do so to me, and more also,
If anything but death parts you and me."

When she [Naomi] saw that she [Ruth] was determined to go with her, she stopped speaking to her.

Now the two of them went until they came to Bethlehem. And

CHAPTER 3: RAHAB Joshua 2:12–20
